SUBJECT: Heat Illness Prevention

---

The Ventura County Department of Agriculture/Weights & Measures is reminding all agricultural employers to be prepared to protect outdoor workers from heat illness during the extended heat wave, predicted to continue through Wednesday, September 7<sup>th</sup>.

According to Cal/OSHA, employers with outdoor workers must take the following steps to prevent heat illness:

- Plan – Develop and implement an effective written heat illness prevention plan that includes emergency response procedures.
- Training – Train all employees and supervisors on heat illness prevention.
- Water – Provide drinking water that is fresh, pure, suitably cool and free of charge so that each worker can drink at least 1 quart per hour, and *encourage workers to do so*.
- Rest – Encourage workers to take a cool-down rest in the shade for at least five minutes when they feel the need to do so to protect themselves from overheating. *Workers should not wait until they feel sick to cool down.*
- Shade – Provide proper shade when temperatures exceed 80 degrees. Workers have the right to request and be provided shade to cool off at any time.
